\*Each term is limited to a maximum of 10 students

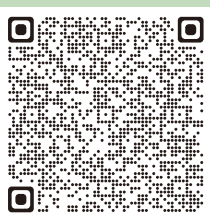
\*There is an intersession break between Term A and B.

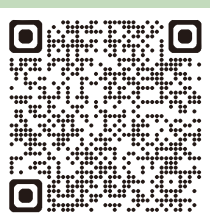
